What is Advent All About?

Advent is the four-week season leading up to Christmas. Advent is a time of waiting and watching as we prepare for the coming of the world's Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. Advent is like preparing for a great party. When we prepare a party for our guests, we clean house and we prepare lots of fancy foods. At some parties we give party favors to our guests. While folks prepare for a party we often hear the words, "Now don't touch the Jello, or don't pick at the turkey!" In other words, we wait, we hold off.


Advent can be a time of getting our own house in order. We "hold off" spending money on ourselves, and instead give gifts to those with less than us. We call it 'the spirit of Christmas,' right? Each year at Lakeland we have a **Giving Tree for The Hope Center,** our Kansas City inner city ministry.

We can "hold off" in other ways during the four weeks leading up to Christmas. We may hold off reading the newspaper or magazine, and instead we may wish to read some of the Old Testament, like the prophet Isaiah, and immerse ourselves in the background of the expectant hope for the Messiah (Anointed One, Savior). We may wish to read a book that draws us close to God. I recommend an easy read like Henri Nouwen's **The Return of the Prodigal Son**. The goal is to finish your book by Christmas Eve.

Lakeland leans into Advent. We celebrate the coming of our Lord. We use Advent to linger over the meaning of the unfathomable God coming to be one of us. Not only did God come to be one of us, he came as one of the least of us, a baby, a peasant, and eventually he goes to the cross, wrongly accused, and dies for the world's sake, executed by the very people he came to redeem. But he rises to inaugurate a new age and a new kingdom. This age has began. We live to see its fulfillment.

A New Celtic Advent Tradition for 2018

This year we use a new Advent resource from the Celtic tradition in Northumbria, UK. The Celtic Christian tradition developed one thousand years ago in isolation. Britian is an island, and when the Christian faith arrived there the Celts put their own spin on Christianity. In recent years the Northumbria Community has revived the Celtic tradition. People tend to like the Celtic tradition because it doesn't seem to be "owned" by any single denomination or common Christian tradition. This Advent liturgy and prayers come from recent authors who studied and borrowed from the ancient Celtic Christian tradition.



How to use this Advent Devotional

Advent is traditionally celebrated on four Sundays leading up to Christmas Eve and on Christmas Eve itself. It is a wonderful way to create holy anticipation of Christmas! Everything about the observance is meant to create feelings of expectation. Of course, you can make your own Advent traditions, but here are a few we recommend:

BEFORE YOU START, you need to prepare a few things:

- 1. The Celtic Advent tradition sings a special short carol, which adds one more verse each week. Make sure you can play it from Lakeland's website. Use your smart phone, iPad, tablet, computer...
- 2. Get your Advent Wreath ready. You can purchase your Advent Wreath kit from Lakeland (or make your own). We recommend purchasing all new candles each year so you don't burn down the house.

As you begin...

- 1. Set a mood. On Sunday night, turn down the lights, turn on some Christmas lights and play some soft Christmas music. Gather around in a family room and sit close together. Read the Sunday night instructions for exactly how to begin each Advent evening.
- 2. Read the appropriate week's Advent liturgy, prayers, and devotional. The Advent Guide will tell you what you need to do each week. There are lots of "call and response" words. So everyone needs to be able to see a guide.
- 3. On the first Sunday, you will only light one candle, the next week you will light two. By Christmas Eve all five candles will be lit! Each Advent evening's instruction will tell you when to light the candle, and what else to do.
- 4. Adjourn to a special treat. Our family likes sparkling fruit juice, German cookies, and lemon bars. You can have any treat you like. It is most fun if the treats are something you only have at Advent time!

Most importantly, RELAX! — especially if you have young children. They will fidget, play, talk, mess with the candles, fight over who gets to blow them out, etc. Rest assured this tradition has meaning.

My brother and I goofed off every year during Advent. My dad never scolded us. Today my brother and I celebrate it with our children as followers of Jesus Christ: The tradition won out. (And now when my children fight over blowing out the candles, Dad smiles a deeply satisfied smile).

Other ideas you might try:

- Light the candles EVERY night of Advent, not just Sunday, when you have dinner together (be ready to buy extra candles).
- Invite friends and extended family over for Advent. Our house can be quite full during this time of vear.
- Hold two Advents; one for kids and one for adults after the kids go to bed.

In your opinion, do we live in a dark world or a light world? Why?

Jesus is the light of the world. Where do we see Jesus' light in our world?

What is your Hope for this Christmas?

who cried, 'Repent for the Kingdom of God is near!' and baptized in the River Jordan many who confessed their sins,

and who pointed out Jesus, 'Behold, the Lamb of God!'

Today, the third week of Advent, we light three candles.

We mark out the Advent path with candle flames.

Now light this week's candle.

3rd Advent: JOY December 16th

Calls and Responses

When our path is menaced by shadows, circle me, Lord; keep light within, keep darkness without.

When our path is targeted by conflict, circle me, Lord; keep love near, keep hatred afar.

When our paith is threatened by worry, circle me, Lord; keep peace within, keep fear without.

Game or Activity

Play the Name Game.

Someone will have to be the Official Reader and not play during a round.

Everyone writes a name - any name - on a slip of paper and folds it twice and drops it in the bowl. It is very important to keep you, your made-up name, and your piece of paper anonymous. The Official Reader goes around and collects all the names from everyone. Everyone is required to play - except the Official Reader (the Official Reader can help non-writers).

After all slips of paper are collected from everyone by the Official Reader, then the Official Reader privately unfolds the slips of paper with the names on them.

Now the Official Reader clearly reads out loud all the names twice through only.

Everyone should pay very close attention.

No one can cheat and take notes. Everyone listens as closely as possible and tries to memorize all the names. The Official Reader cannot ask for clarifications or proper pronounciations. They just read all the names twice through only.

The Name Game begins with the youngest person asking another person in the group, "Are you [Patrick Mahomes]?" If 'yes,' then that person must get up and join the asker's team. Together they ask another person, "Are you [Bob Cratchet]?" If yes, then they continue to build their team. But if the answer is 'no' then the person they asked takes over and gets to ask someone what their name might be.

There are two winners. First there is the winning team, because in the end everyone is on their team! Game over. The second winner could be a person for whom no one guessed their name!

Advent Week 3 Reflection and Discussion

(You don't have to ask and answer all the questions. Pick appropriate questions for children and/or adults.)

Traditions tell us who we are. Communities define our identity. But the most powerful identity creators are our parents (like it or not!)

John the Baptist's parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth, were very godly parents and shaped John into one of the most holy, honorable, and significant people in the history of the world.

Since traditions shape us, what is your favorite Christmas tradition?

What dream does/did your parent(s) have for you?

Do you know what your given name means? Why did your parents name you that name?

Advent Week 4 Reflection and Discussion

Discussion question: Why does Mary trust God, and Zechariah doesn't trust God? Read the following Reflection before answering.

Both Zechariah and Mary have questions for the angel Gabriel. It appears both have doubts. Zechariah: "How will I know that this is so?" Mary: "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" But Mary is honored, and Zechariah... well, not so much. Perhaps Mary experiences a "consoling" presence of God. God is with her. She has many unanswered questions, but she trusts God. She feels safe even though she knows in her head this is crazy talk: "I am a virgin!" But Zechariah really doesn't believe Gabriel. Zechariah has no settled peace or trust in God. He caves into fear. He doesn't believe God can actually do what God's going to do. Mary believes God in uncertainty. Zechariah doubts God with uncertainty. Since Zechariah cannot accept the most fundamental truth about God, that God is God and therefore entirely trustworthy, then the angel decides that it might be a good idea if Zechariah doesn't talk about his doubts – for about five months! Mary is a "treasurer." She "treasures and ponders all these things in her heart" (Lk 2:19). Here is the irony in story: Mary willingly enters into silence. Zechariah is forced into silence. To know the will of God all of us will enter into silence – one way or another.

My honest observation is that most of us are more like Zechariah. We doubt and question the voice of God. We live in emotional desolation, not emotional consolation. No wonder we need to practice solitude and especially silence. We could do with a good lip-sealing on a regular basis. Better for us to bake upon the words of God for our lives, rather than blab on and on, responding out of our absence from God's presence, rather than God's very real presence.

This isn't to say Mary isn't paying attention to her desolating feelings. Otherwise she would not have questioned Gabriel. But Mary holds both desolation and consolation together. Desolation is not evil, just as fear is not innately evil. Fear keeps us from entering a lion's cage for example. Fear's good opinion! Desolations inform us as well as consolations. Mary pays attention to her disturbing feelings of disquiet. She is aware of what is going on inside of her. She can pray a prayer of receptivity. "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word" (1:38). She is aware of her emotions, but she can receive the word of the Lord. Also, Mary chooses to be indifferent to her personal stake in the news. She takes a servant role. On the other hand, Zechariah is not aware of his desolating feeling's voice of truth. He just uncritically doubts. He doesn't believe. Why? (This is the discussion question.)

Within my studies of power and powerlessness, the pattern appears that those who are without power – like Mary – seem more accepting of God's intervention and authority. While those who have power – Zechariah, a male of the priestly Hebrew tribe of Levi – appear to hold onto their power to their own detriment. Powerlessness tills the soul's soil enough to receive the seed of the Word. This is validated by all of us when sooner or later we experience "powerlessness" in the form of illness, tragedy, loss, and ruin. Everyone gets religion when they are being shelled in a foxhole. These orisons, the prayer of desperation, come unbidden and come unglued from doubts. Powerless Mary eats and breathes this unbidden life. Privileged Zechariah lives by his wits and tradition. His soil is hard-packed. It is difficult for Gabriel to convince him. So Gabriel prescribes the time-tested treatment: silence. And it works! Zechariah sees the light when John is born and reclaims the words of the prophets of old:

Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has looked favorably on his people and redeemed them.

He has raised up a mighty savior for us in the house of his servant David... Luke 1:68-69

Sung to tune of The Holly and the Ivy. One verse is added with each candle each week. All sing verses 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Advent Carol.

A baby in a stable brings joy to all the earth. He comes, our Emmanuel, and we celebrate his birth

The Reader reads the following out loud for everyone:

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.'
